

50 Acts of Kindness

It has been proven that being altruistic (doing things for others without expecting anything in return) has a positive impact on, not just the health of others, but the health of ourselves. A recent study by Dr Tristan Inagaki has shown that being kind to others lowered inflammation levels in the blood and therefore reduced the possibility of chronic diseases. As part of our commitment to fostering a culture of kindness and develop more empathy within the school community, we were thrilled to introduce the Acts of Kindness Challenge and see if it made a difference to our wellbeing. The challenge has helped us to celebrate 50 years of belonging to Round Square's Global Community. Our acts of kindness were inspired by the Round Square IDEALS.

The school community really bought into the idea and there were many amazing acts of kindness from simple acts to much more elaborate. Here are some examples:

'Took my Nana out for lunch'

'Bought cake for my tutor group'

'I am organising a meeting for my tutees with the elderly members of Windermere Community when they can have tea/coffee and share their stories with the children. Some of the elderly people live alone and would really appreciate to have a chat with the young people.'

Japan



My name is Ethan, and I chose to go to Japan for my exchange experience. This was because I was interested in Japanese culture and history and thought that exchange was an amazing opportunity!

I talked to Mrs Holmes and she got it all sorted very quickly! She found a school that was very interested in the Round Square exchange exchange program. The school was called Kansai International Academy and it was a beautiful school located in the heart of Kansai, Osaka. Osaka is a beautiful place with lots of temples. Osaka is a charming, relaxed city best known for its food and fun—with some history and culture peeking through. Osaka is only a short shinkansen (bullet train) ride from Tokyo, but has a very different feeling to Japan's capital city. There is lots of delicious food and straight-talking, friendly locals. Along with plenty of shopping and modern attractions, Osaka also has a historical side, the highlight of which is Osaka Castle. The castle is a great place to discover more about Japanese history and to wander the beautiful grounds, especially during cherry blossom season in April when the sakura (Cherry blossom trees) blooms and the weather is often at its best.

One custom that the Japanese take very seriously and that stood out to me was removing their shoes whenever they entered a domestic building. They also give gifts to say thank you! I stayed with a host family who were very lovely. I even slept on the traditional, Futon, Japanese style bed. (The Futon was very comfortable although it felt strange at the time.) I had an amazing stay and we are looking forward to welcoming my exchange buddy to England later this year.

The language barrier was not as big as I expected. I even got private Japanese lessons every Friday, which I really enjoyed! I got to go to a local Japanese supermarket. And I got run over by a robot!

One of the best parts of my trip was visiting Himeji Castle. Himeji Castle is the finest surviving example of early 17th-century Japanese castle architecture, comprising of 83 buildings with highly developed systems of defence. It is a masterpiece of construction in wood, combining function with aesthetic appeal. This beautiful building is a definite must go.



What are your Self-reflections?

I'll start university in September. People have told me many things that make me excited about this new chapter in my life but the one that stuck with me most is this: "You have complete freedom to reinvent yourself." I found that strange. I don't want to reinvent myself. I am lucky to be happy with my identity, but let's say I did want to... How exactly do you reinvent yourself?

To begin with, I think it's important to think about what identity really means. Is your identity what you understand yourself to be? In this case it must be incredibly difficult to reinvent yourself as our understandings of ourselves are complex and built up across a lifetime. For example, a large part of my identity is my creativity. It's a skill I value, and it has been something I understood about my own identity since I was a very little girl. How would I change this? In a society that sometimes undervalues "soft skills" such as creativity, perhaps it would be easier to lie to myself, to say that I value other aspects of my personality. I may be able to convince others of this, but I would be lying to myself.

So, perhaps our identity is shaped by those around us and their perceptions of our character? If so, this would be an easier way to reinvent ourselves. We could mix with new people, take up new interests and hobbies. In this sense we are entirely capable of controlling the perceptions others make about us purely by choosing what they see. Yet, this also seems disingenuous.

Therefore, we should not be asking how to reinvent ourselves but, why? I think this is the key to deciding whether reinvention would be a positive or negative process within your life. You know yourself better than anyone else does. As Polonius said to Laertes 'To thine own self be true. And it must follow, as the night the day, Thou canst not then be false to any man.' If you are true to yourself, you will find you are true to others. If you find that the difference between who you know you are and who people think you are is too stark, then perhaps reinvention is possible. Even then it is revealing your true identity rather than finding a new one.

We all have the opportunity in life to change, and we should. We are perpetually growing, learning, and making mistakes, but I think it's important to remain true to the things that define who we are. I've learned so much about myself in my time at Windermere School. I've changed a great deal over the years, but I think I can say I've remained true to who I am. Regardless of the ways I'll change, I know I'll keep my principles. I hope anyone who faces change in life can remain true to their identity, and I hope anyone who feels they're not true to who they are can find the courage to show their true identity.

As Captain Holt said in Brooklyn 99; "Every time someone steps up and says who they are, the world becomes a better, more interesting place."

What is your favourite book?

My favourite book changes depending on what I have just read, but I think at the moment it is *Lessons in Chemistry*. It's a great new book that has come out. It tells the story of Elizabeth Zott, who becomes a cooking show host in 1960s California after being fired as a chemist four years earlier.

What is one piece of advice you would like to give to Windermere School students?

Learn your Chemistry first time, and learn your ions tests first time! But also, and possibly more importantly, be yourself and don't get caught up with other people's discussions and thoughts. Be yourself.

If you could be a fruit or vegetable, what would you be?

BEHIND THE SCENES...

The school's production of *Little Shop of Horrors* was a definite success in December, even in the face of the rather unexpected blizzard disturbing rehearsals. In this issue of BrowHeadline, we will be interviewing some of the cast to find out their perspectives on the show from behind the curtain!

Millie (Y10) / Audrey

What was the biggest challenge you faced in the production?

"I think the biggest challenge I was faced with was definitely getting the Audrey voice. She has a high-pitched American accent and I found it a huge challenge to get my voice to her standard not only in acting but also singing."



What was the funniest moment of the production?

"I think the funniest moment has to be Thomas and Ollie's salsa dance. They worked very hard on it and I think it was most of the cast's favourite scene."

What were your biggest takeaways from the production?

"I think the friendships I formed. When you have to work with a group of people through a production it forms a bond between cast members as everyone is supporting everyone. Although at times it might be stressful and chaotic, everyone is taking part in it together and so I think my biggest takeaway from the production was friendships."



How do you think it has benefitted you?

"It has helped me gain confidence in accents, but also helped me create a story more when acting. Little Shop of Horrors has a man-eating plant in it and so when it comes to Audrey and Audrey II (the plants) duet I had to prove to the audience I was scared in different ways. Similarly, Audrey has had a bad background in life and so I had to prove to the audience that I was sad in different ways. Showing emotions like this throughout the production helped me to create a storyline for the audience to make it clear and enjoyable to watch."



Thomas (Y13) / Seymour Krelborn

What was the biggest challenge you faced during the production?

"On the whole, it was balancing the production with my schoolwork & things outside of school - it was what had put me off doing the production in previous years. I was whisked off to Cambridge for an interview just a couple days before the production too, forcing me to miss the last few dress rehearsals & arriving back only in time for prep & production on the opening night, which really didn't help - but we persevered & everyone involved did a fantastic job!

That week was certainly the most thrilling week of my life!"

What was the funniest moment of the production?

"This is a tough one... the "Mushnik & Son" song with Ollie was huge fun & the source of much hilarity, but I think Josh's inspired moment of improv on the final night when his screen with the photo of a rotten mouth was put onstage back-to-front is the comic highlight for me. The spontaneous "What the heck?" Before continuing was really natural & just hilarious thanks to that!"



What are your biggest takeaways from the production?

"Foremost is how much I bonded with the whole cast throughout the production; finding & reforming friendships which had been sadly weakened over lockdown, now coming back together. I'll always treasure this production for that! Secondly is the realisation that not all musicals are evil - previously I had been quite put off by them for their silliness (especially more serious ones), so finding Little Shop has been a breath of fresh air there."

How do you think it has benefitted you?

"Foremost is the confidence it has built for me onstage, and in learning lines for productions like this. It being a musical helped in that regard, with tunes & such kind of acting as cues. Also was acting with other people - the challenge of being onstage with others, reacting to their words naturally & making the interactions seem real (even those with a giant man-eating plant alien seeking to destroy the world). Also is how it has taught me to balance what I am doing in my life - previously, my organisation was very chaotic. Now, it is only relatively chaotic - much better than it was in Year 12 & before, and funnily it is thanks to the production teaching me that that I feel I am handling the IB well!"

What was the biggest challenge you faced during the production?

"Staying in school & working until 8pm most nights was really hard, since usually I just chill out after school, so I'm glad I was able to keep going each of the nights."

What was the funniest moment of the production?

"For me, it was the bit of improv I did on the last night when the screen was the wrong way round, definitely the best bit of improv I've ever done!"

What are your main takeaways from the production?

"I've realised that commitment to a goal like this can really help you get things done, rather than just sitting around all day & not *doing* it, or at least done badly. Instead, it's thanks to the commitment to the production from everyone that it was such a good one."

There you have it - a little insight into the tribulations & triumphs of some of the cast. A huge thank you to everyone involved & we hope to see some of them in next year's production!








RIVETING READS: THE REVOLUTION LUANA

Little Women is an empowering novel about four sisters who are each striving to be the best that they can be by dreaming big and finding happiness in small things.
